



Public expenditure on childcare and pre-primary education and total public expenditure on early childhood education and care, as a % of GDP, 2013 and latest available a





Figure 3. Distribution of Preschool Enrollment for Children Ages Three and Four, 2015





Figure 10. Mixing of Major Public Program Funding Within Preschools





STORY IDEAS, KEY TAKE AWAYS

- ECE is costly because quality is a highly competent adult individualizing with a child 1:1 and in small groups
- US is a low public spender for a wealthy country
- Dozens of public funding streams but only a few have much money
- No one knows how much public funding is spent on ECE
- Public funding is unevenly distributed by age, income, & geography
- Cities are becoming big players
- Parents don't necessarily pay oft-quoted list prices
